Blessed is the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary which bore the Son of the Eternal Father. And blessed are the breasts which nursed Christ our Lord.

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

We see Christ our victorious King in his power (Philippians Ct.), and God's care over his chosen ones (Ps 118 & 15). There are two principal objects to our Vesper prayers: thanksgiving, and new courage to continue our pilgrimage during the coming week.





The strophe from Ps 118 gives the picture of a battle raging back and forth between God and the world. We keep throwing new reserves into the battle, the religious motivations that are meant to keep us faithful.

This is my commandment: that you should love one another (John 15:12)

Fourteenth strophe: In spite of peril I will be true

All: so that each day / there may be bread enough for all.


